Ek Kadam Aur is a nonprofit organization registered in India (80G) and the US (501c3) that works towards delivering quality education to underprivileged children in India and Nepal. We work at the crucial juncture where blindness, poverty, and lack of accessibility converge.

The Ek Kadam Aur's vision is to create a world where every child has the right to quality education, access to skill enhancement, and healthcare.

Our Mission

Our mission is to help underprivileged children improve their lives through education, technology, and healthcare initiatives.

Our Programs

Arunodaya (Sunrise) for Blind Program: Provides specialized training to visually impaired children (ages 5-17) from rural India, preparing them for mainstream education through one-on-one mentoring and special education support.

High School Leadership Program: Flagship initiative offering training in 21st-century skills, featuring entrepreneurship boot camps, and research-based learning opportunities for high school students.

Active Learning Program: Transforms traditional classrooms into student-centered learning environments through teacher training workshops and interactive learning methodologies.

Nurturing Youth Leadership: Hosts student interns from leading U.S. universities (NYU, Harvard, MIT) to foster global perspectives and create social impact opportunities while benefiting from academic insights.

Message from the President



As Ek Kadam Aur completes ten years of its journey, I reflect not only on what we have built, but on why we began. In 2015, Ek Kadam Aur was founded with a clear and uncompromising belief that education, confidence, and dignity must reach children who are systematically excluded, not because they lack ability, but because they lack access.

What began as a small step rooted in equity has, over a decade, evolved into a mission shaped by communities, strengthened by evidence, and driven by inclusion. Our early years were grounded in listening and learning. Working closely with first-generation learners in rural and low-income communities taught us a foundational truth that continues to guide our work today. Talent exists everywhere, opportunity does not. From leadership and confidence-building workshops to academic and exposure-based learning, we learned that aspiration flourishes when children are seen, supported, and challenged. As we formalized our presence in India between 2016 and 2017, building trust within communities and strengthening governance structures, our focus remained clear. Education must be community-rooted to be sustainable.

The launch of the High School Leadership Program marked a defining chapter in our evolution. By working with adolescents across remote geographies in India and Nepal, we saw leadership emerge not as a privilege, but as a practice. Through mentorship, virtual classrooms, STEM exposure, career guidance, and global perspectives, students learned to communicate, think critically, and lead with empathy. Over time, HSLP matured into a holistic leadership incubator, integrating communication mastery, future-ready technology exposure, mental well-being, civic responsibility, and cultural awareness, preparing young people not just for examinations, but for life.

The COVID-19 pandemic tested every assumption we held about education delivery. Yet, it also revealed a powerful insight that reshaped our trajectory. Digital tools enable independence, not just continuity. As children navigated smartphones, audio platforms, and remote learning with confidence, we recognized that technology could dismantle barriers far beyond physical classrooms. This realization became the foundation for our most transformative work.

The year 2025 stands as a landmark in our journey. It marked Ek Kadam Aur Foundation's transition from a predominantly tactile, Braille-dependent support model to a digital accessibility-enabled learning ecosystem. While Braille remains a vital foundation of literacy, accessibility is no longer limited by physical materials.

Screen readers, smartphones, assistive technologies, and AI-enabled tools now power how children learn, write, communicate, rehearse, navigate, and participate independently. This shift reaffirmed a core belief. Empowerment is not delivered through assistance, but through accessibility-enabled independence.

Across nine states, we witnessed children independently coordinating events, preparing speeches using voice typing, navigating public spaces with confidence, and excelling in academics, sports, and cultural platforms. Parents transitioned from hesitation to advocacy. Educators evolved into trained accessibility facilitators. Schools began embracing inclusion not as accommodation, but as standard educational practice.

As we close this decade, Ek Kadam Aur stands as a stable, evidence-driven, multi-state organization with a clear roadmap for the future. Our work has reached hundreds of children, families, educators, and institutions. More importantly, it has demonstrated what is possible when education is personalized, technology-enabled, and community-rooted.

A heartfelt note of gratitude to our Board members, whose guidance and governance continue to strengthen our vision; to our volunteers and mentors, who give their time, skills, and compassion to bring learning to life; to our institutional and community partners, who walk alongside us in building inclusive and sustainable systems; and to our donors and supporters, whose trust and belief make this work possible. Each contribution, whether strategic, financial, or on the ground, has played a vital role in shaping Ek Kadam Aur Foundation's journey over the past decade. As we look ahead, we remain excited and deeply committed to continuing this journey together, learning from one another, strengthening our impact, and reaching many more children with opportunity, dignity, and hope.

Looking Ahead: The Decade Forward

The next decade calls us to move from demonstrating impact to embedding inclusion within systems. Ek Kadam Aur Foundation will focus on strengthening institutional partnerships, aligning closely with government education frameworks, and ensuring that digital accessibility becomes an integral part of mainstream education delivery. Our screen-reader-first, technology-enabled model will continue to evolve, supporting children not only through schooling, but into higher education, vocational pathways, and dignified employment.

We will deepen investments in educator and mentor capacity-building, expand evidence-based monitoring systems, and continue empowering parents as long-term partners in learning. Assistive technology, AI-enabled learning tools, and accessible digital platforms will remain central, not as add-ons, but as foundational enablers of independence and participation.

At the heart of our vision lies dignity. The future we work toward is one where children are not defined by disability or circumstance, but by ability, aspiration, and agency. As Ek Kadam Aur Foundation steps into its second decade, we remain guided by the same belief that inspired our first step ten years ago. When children are given access, they do not merely learn. They rise, lead, and transform the world around them.



10 Years of **Ek Kadam Aur**

2015

The First Step A Vision Rooted in Equity

Ek Kadam Aur began its journey in 2015 with registration in the United States as a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organisation. Founded under the leadership of Dr. Satish Tripathi, the organisation was built on a simple yet powerful belief:

Education, confidence, and dignity must reach children who are systematically excluded.

In its earliest phase, Ek Kadam Aur worked closely with rural and low-income communities, particularly first-generation learners with limited exposure to quality education. Early interventions focused on:

- Leadership and confidence-building workshops
- Foundational academic support
- Exposure-based learning to bridge aspiration gaps

This year shaped the organisation's core philosophy: exclusion is not caused by lack of talent, but by lack of access and opportunity.



Building Structure, Building Trust

From Vision to Organisation

2017

In 2017, Ek Kadam Aur formally established its operations in India as a Section 8 non-profit company, enabling transparent governance, statutory compliance, and long-term sustainability.

Grassroots education programs were launched across rural districts of Uttar Pradesh. Key program components included:

- Academic and extracurricular support within government schools
- Mentoring to strengthen motivation and learning continuity
- Community engagement with parents and local stakeholders

A defining insight emerged during this phase:

Talent exists everywhere. Opportunity does not.

By the end of 2017, Ek Kadam Aur had earned deep community trust and built a strong institutional foundation for expansion.





High School Leadership Program

Investing in Adolescents and Leadership

In 2018, Ek Kadam Aur launched the High School Leadership Program (HSLP), focusing on adolescents in remote and low-resource secondary schools.

The program expanded across Andhra Pradesh, Ladakh, and Nepal

HSLP emphasised:

- Leadership, communication, and critical thinking
- Exposure to mentors and professionals
- Virtual classrooms connecting learners with educators and volunteers across geographies

This phase established Ek Kadam Aur's early strengths in mentor-driven pedagogy, virtual learning delivery, and youth leadership development.



Leadership from the Ground Up

Learning, Ownership, and Community Engagement

During 2019, the organisation deepened its focus on active learning and leadership, moving beyond conventional classroom methods.

Programs prioritised:

- Leadership and entrepreneurship skills
- The Active Learning Curriculum, supported by Jeremy Bhatia (Harvard Kennedy School Intern), introduced experiential and inquiry-based learning
- The Community Educator (Train-the-Trainers) Model, led by Saumya Tripathi, expanded to additional schools

At the same time, Ek Kadam Aur strengthened **community ownership of education**. Young adults and senior students from within the same communities were trained to mentor younger children, creating locally sustained learning cycles.

These efforts resulted in:

- Students taking ownership of their learning and aspirations
- Communities becoming active partners in education delivery

This phase laid the philosophical foundation for Ek Kadam Aur's future inclusion-focused work.



From Classrooms to Communities Scaling Leadership and Active Learning

In 2020, Ek Kadam Aur consolidated its leadership and community-based education models.

- Leadership and entrepreneurship initiatives were implemented
- Learner-centred, activity-based pedagogy
- Critical thinking, communication, and problem-solving

By the end of 2020, Ek Kadam Aur demonstrated that community-rooted education models can scale without compromising quality.



COVID and the Digital Turning Point Continuity Through Technology

The COVID-19 pandemic disrupted education nationwide. Ek Kadam Aur responded by transitioning programs to fully digital and remote formats across Uttar Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, and West Bengal.

Using smartphones, audio-based tools, and accessible platforms, learning continuity was ensured. Parents, especially mothers were engaged as co-educators in home-based learning.

A critical insight emerged:

Digital tools enable independence, not just continuity.

Children began navigating technology confidently, laying the groundwork for the organisation's next strategic shift.

Arunodaya Is Born

Addressing Educational Exclusion for Children with Blindness



In 2022, Ek Kadam Aur launched Arunodaya (Sunrise) - a structured response to the systemic exclusion of children with blindness from education.

The program began in:

- Uttar Pradesh
- Madhya Pradesh
- Rajasthan
- West Bengal



Arunodaya introduced:

- One-on-one home-based mentoring
- Digital literacy using smartphones and assistive technology
- Orientation and mobility training
- Daily living skills and parental counselling

Independence and confidence became central educational outcomes.



From Home-Based Learning to School Inclusion

Turning Readiness into Participation

During 2023, EKAF focused on transitioning children trained under Arunodaya into mainstream government and private schools across five states: Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, West Bengal, and Chhattisgarh.

Support included:

- School enrolment facilitation
- Teacher orientation on inclusive practices
- Access to EPUB-based and audio-supported curriculum
- Provision of tactile learning materials

Continuous mentoring ensured children were actively participating in classrooms, not merely enrolled.



Scaling Inclusion From Program to Institution

In 2024, Arunodaya scaled across nine states, with expansion into rural and tribal regions.

Key system-strengthening efforts included:

- Educator training and master-trainer development
- Monitoring, assessment, and reporting frameworks
- Safeguarding, compliance, and data protection protocols

Quality assurance ensured consistency across geographies.



Consolidation and the Road Ahead

From Scale to Sustainability

The final year of the decade focused on consolidation and evidence-building.

Priorities included:

- Strengthening baseline, midline, and endline assessments
- Documenting outcomes and case studies for CSR and government engagement
- Workforce development, including educators with lived experience of blindness
- Alignment with national education policies

By 2025, Ek Kadam Aur emerged as a stable, multi-state, evidence-driven organisation with a clear roadmap for the next decade.

Geographic Coverage

Digital Accessibility Led Learning Model

The year 2025 marked a decisive evolution in Ek Kadam Aur Foundation's approach to education for children with visual impairment and blindness. The Foundation transitioned from a predominantly tactile and Braille centric support system to a digital accessibility led learning model that places independence at the core of education delivery.

Braille continued to serve as the foundation of early literacy, while accessible digital technology became the primary medium for reading, writing, communication, and learning progression. A screen reader first approach was institutionalised across the program, enabling learners to independently access educational content, complete assignments, communicate with mentors, and manage their learning routines.



This shift positioned accessibility as a means to independence rather than support, strengthening the Foundation's focus on long-term empowerment in a digital world.

Strengthening the Learning Ecosystem

Recognising that sustainable outcomes depend on consistent reinforcement, the Foundation focused on strengthening the wider learning ecosystem. Educators and mentors were supported to deliver accessibility led instruction, parents were engaged to reinforce independent learning routines at home, and schools were guided to maintain inclusive participation of learners with visual impairment.

This ecosystem approach ensured continuity of learning beyond training periods and created alignment between home, school, and community environments. As a result, learners demonstrated greater consistency, confidence, and ownership of their learning journeys.



Orientation, Mobility, and Real World Independence

Orientation and mobility training remained a critical focus in 2025. Learners received structured instruction to build spatial awareness, safe movement, and decision making skills. Practice environments extended beyond classrooms to include school corridors, neighbourhood pathways, markets, and community spaces.

This emphasis on real world navigation enabled children to move with greater confidence and reduced dependency in daily activities. Improved mobility also supported participation in school attendance, community events, and public platforms.

Academic Progress and Co Curricular Achievement

Throughout 2025, learners demonstrated steady academic progress alongside co curricular achievements. Children participated in adaptive sports, public speaking, music, and competitive events at local, district, and state levels. Successes in examinations, scholarships, and competitions reflected disciplined preparation, structured mentoring, and growing independence.

Individual achievements, including state level sports recognition and academic distinctions, illustrated the effectiveness of a holistic approach that balances education, physical development, and confidence building.

State Level Examples with Learner Outcomes

Maharashtra



Krushna Pawar, an Arunodaya learner from Mahabaleshwar, Satara district, secured a gold medal at the Maharashtra State Powerlifting Competition in her first participation in the sport. A Class 10 student and NMMS Sarathi Scholarship recipient, Krushna balanced academics with yoga, public speaking, and competitive sports, reflecting holistic development and academic continuity.



In the same state, **Yugandhara Todkar** from Satara district topped her Class 6 school examinations, demonstrating consistent academic progress supported through structured learning routines.

Madhya Pradesh

In Jabalpur, twin brothers **Sanskar** and **Siddhant**, supported through the Arunodaya program, secured second and fourth ranks respectively in their Class 3 school examinations. Their performance highlighted early academic stability and sustained parental and mentor engagement.





Uttar Pradesh



In Auraiya district, programs were held at the Tehsil level at the Block Education Officer's office and at the district level at Nagar Palika Inter College. Children including **Alphej, Chhavi, Mohan, Vishal, Shaurya, Mohit, Pooja, Sanjay Babu, and Anmol** participated in various competitions and won awards.

Chhavi and Alphej secured first place in Touch and Identify, Chhavi won the 100-meter cane race, Shaurya secured first place in Braille reading and writing, Anmol won second place in singing, and Sanjay Babu secured second place in Touch and Identify.

At Kompozit School, Babedi Ghazipur, **Kirti, Gudiya, Abdul Wahid, Monu, Arvind, and Shalu Kumari** participated and received awards. Gudiya Kumar secured third place in singing, Arvind Kumar and Abdul Wahid won second place in the Touch and Identify competition, while Kirti, Monu, and Shalu Kumar received consolation prizes.

Similarly, in Kannauj and Etawah, **Ojas and Divyansh** participated in the programs, and **Nandini** delivered a speech. All participating children received consolation prizes.



West Bengal

Ayush Manna, an Arunodaya learner from West Bengal, secured third position in an adaptive chess competition at a state level inclusive festival. The achievement reflected strong concentration, strategic thinking, and balanced engagement in academics and co curricular activities.



Cultural Participation and Public Engagement

Ek Kadam Aur ensured that inclusion extended beyond academics to expression, confidence building, and public participation. Learners across states took part in national observances, cultural programs, literacy events, and institutional celebrations. These platforms enabled children to present performances, share ideas, and engage with wider audiences.

Participation in public events strengthened self expression, visibility, and social confidence, while also contributing to changing community perceptions around disability and ability.



By the end of 2025, the following outcomes were consistently observed across regions:

- **Children demonstrated increased confidence, independence, and participation**
- **Parents and caregivers showed greater trust in children's abilities and learning pathways**
- **Schools and institutions strengthened inclusive engagement practices**
- **Communities increasingly recognised children with visual impairment as contributors rather than dependents**

These outcomes reflected a shift from participation as exception to participation as norm.

Curriculum and Training Overview

In 2025, Ek Kadam Aur strengthened its curriculum and training systems to support consistent learning for children with blindness across home, school, and community settings. The focus remained on independence, accessibility, and continuity of learning.

A structured parent training curriculum was implemented across states to help families reinforce learning at home. The modules addressed understanding visual impairment, promoting independence, use of assistive technology, activities of daily living, emotional support, and school inclusion. This strengthened home based learning environments during the early phase of the program.

To ensure consistent implementation, digital literacy and inclusive teaching modules were developed for educators. Field educators were trained in screen reader use, accessible digital content, and basic digital skills, while mainstream teachers received guidance on inclusive classroom practices and tactile adaptations. These efforts supported uniform program delivery across diverse settings. Self paced learning modules were introduced for children to encourage independent study. Available for Classes 1 to 6, these modules combined audio guided instruction with accessible content and tactile activities, supporting both academic and functional skill development.

The Ananya Curriculum, aligned with the Expanded Core Curriculum framework, was revised to strengthen non academic learning areas such as orientation and mobility, daily living skills, sensory integration, and early digital literacy. All revisions were informed by field feedback to ensure relevance across contexts.

Training was delivered through a blended online and offline model across eight states. A Master Trainer approach supported cascading knowledge to field educators, with quality checks and regular reviews ensuring consistency.

- **68 educators trained**
- **15 Master Trainers developed**
- **1,249 parent sensitisation sessions conducted**
- **449 online training sessions delivered**
- **12 internal offline training sessions conducted**
- **2 special schools engaged under the special school model**

Quality Assurance and Monitoring

In 2025, Ek Kadam Aur strengthened its quality assurance systems to ensure consistent and high-quality implementation of the Arunodaya program across all states. A structured compliance framework was used to track learning progress, participation, and adherence to approved program standards.

Each state was supported by a dedicated Compliance Manager responsible for monitoring schedules, validating field data, and tracking child progress and family engagement. State level compliance was coordinated nationally to ensure uniform standards and timely oversight.

Weekly virtual review meetings enabled real-time monitoring and issue resolution. Field level challenges related to attendance, access, and learning continuity were addressed promptly through peer coordination or escalation to senior leadership. Action points were tracked until closure using shared monitoring tools.

Attendance and participation were monitored across online classes, field visits, parent sessions, and community activities to ensure regular engagement and reduce dropout risk.

A multi-stage assessment framework supported impact tracking throughout the program. Baseline, midline, and endline assessments measured progress in daily living skills, digital literacy, mobility, and independence. Monthly learning checks and school assimilation monitoring ensured continued support as children transitioned into classrooms.

All activities were implemented in line with approved internal guidelines, donor requirements, and inclusive education standards. Standardised tools, documentation, and review processes were followed across states.



Uttar Pradesh

Shubham's Journey to a Confident Digital Learner



Shubham Raikwar, a Class 6 student from Jhansi, Uttar Pradesh, is a young boy full of curiosity, talent, and determination. With a deep love for music - singing and playing instruments like the sitar and tabla, Shubham always carried immense potential. What he needed was the right opportunity to unlock it.

That turning point came through Arunodaya, when a special educator introduced Shubham's family to the possibilities of digital learning for children with blindness. Initially hesitant, his parents were unsure how home-based learning could support their son. Their doubts gave way to hope when they learned how digital literacy could empower Shubham to use smartphones, type in Hindi and English, and learn independently.

Once enrolled, Shubham embraced learning with discipline and enthusiasm. His journey included training in daily living skills, assistive technology, screen readers, typing, and confidence-building digital activities. With consistent support from his educator and encouragement from his family, Shubham soon began operating a smartphone independently and practicing typing every day.

A defining milestone came when Shubham represented Arunodaya at the "Right to Write" English Typing Competition in Noida. Competing alongside peers in a mainstream environment, he demonstrated not only speed and accuracy but also the power of inclusion.

Today, Shubham studies with confidence, communicates independently, and inspires other families who are unsure about digital education for children with blindness.

A Parent's Voice: From Worry to Confidence

Anushka Kaushik, who lost her vision due to illness, once struggled with fear, hesitation, and limited mobility. Social interactions felt overwhelming, and moving independently seemed impossible. Through Arunodaya, Anushka received structured support in daily living skills, digital literacy, and communication. Gradually, her confidence began to grow. Today, she moves freely within her surroundings, communicates with assurance, uses digital tools independently, and continues her education with renewed hope and self-belief.



Dileshwari, a bright Class 9 student from Chhattisgarh, faced significant challenges in reading and writing after losing her vision. With dedicated mentoring under Arunodaya, she was introduced to assistive technology such as TalkBack, EasyReader, and smartphone-based learning tools. Through consistent practice and encouragement, Dileshwari learned to read and write independently and now studies confidently, keeping pace with her school curriculum.



High School Leadership Program (HSLP)

In 2025, the High School Leadership Program (HSLP) evolved into a powerful platform for nurturing confident, empathetic, and future-ready young leaders across India and Nepal. Anchored in the belief that leadership is developed through practice rather than privilege, HSLP created an inclusive learning environment where students learned to think critically, communicate effectively, and lead with purpose.

Throughout the year, the program combined leadership education, communication mastery, STEM exposure, career readiness, and mental well-being - offering students a truly holistic learning experience.

Key Highlights

Leadership & Communication Excellence

Leadership development formed the foundation of HSLP, with sessions focused on building authenticity, emotional intelligence, inclusive leadership, teamwork, persuasion, and conflict resolution.

Communication was the program's core strength. Students participated in public speaking workshops, debates, storytelling sessions, Model United Nations (MUN) training, spoken English mentoring, active listening exercises, and expressive communication modules, strengthening confidence, clarity, and self-expression.

STEM Learning & Future-Ready Technologies

HSLP introduced students to key scientific and technological concepts through engaging, age-appropriate sessions. Topics included brain and learning science, atomic structure, algebra and polynomials, ecosystems, environmental sustainability, computer science evolution, and the scientific method.

Future-focused learning covered artificial intelligence, cybersecurity awareness, fake news literacy, digital citizenship, website development, carbon footprint analysis, and responsible social media engagement, preparing students for a rapidly changing world.



Career Guidance & Practical Skill Building

Students received structured career guidance covering career exploration, college and job applications, interviews, scholarships, entrance examinations, and professional documentation.

Practical skill sessions strengthened time management, emotional intelligence, presentation design, and effective use of tools such as PowerPoint - equipping students with essential real-world competencies.



Mental Health & Well-Being

Recognizing the importance of emotional resilience, HSLP prioritized student well-being through sessions on mental health awareness for teenagers, understanding emotions, stress management, self-love, journaling, art therapy, and healthy relationships with food. These sessions encouraged self-reflection, emotional regulation, and balanced personal growth.

Social Awareness & Community Leadership

HSLP encouraged students to become socially responsible changemakers. Discussions addressed civic awareness, children's rights, financial literacy, ethical decision-making, and conflict resolution. Interactive discussions helped students explore their potential to create positive societal impact.

Special sessions on **International Women's Day** and **Independence Day** connected leadership values with history, equality, and national identity.

Global Exposure & Cultural Learning

Students benefited from interactions with mentors from leading institutions and organizations, including global universities and industry leaders. These sessions broadened perspectives, inspired aspiration, and exposed students to diverse career pathways.

The **Cultural Exchange Program** and **I-Search Final Presentations** provided platforms for collaboration, critical inquiry, and peer learning, fostering confidence and global awareness.

Continuous Engagement & Feedback

Student participation remained high through interactive discussions, feedback cycles, doubt-clearing sessions, and structured reflections. Regular feedback via discussions and digital tools ensured continuous improvement and learner-centered program delivery.

Reflection, Vision & Goal Setting

Monthly orientations and reflective activities encouraged students to explore their aspirations and strengths. Exercises such as Dream Mapping, Superpower Mapping, goal-setting workshops, and future planning sessions helped students build clarity, confidence, and long-term vision.


Ambassadors of Change

Active Learning Program

Program Origin

At Ek Kadam Aur Foundation, education is viewed as an active and engaging process rather than a one-way transfer of information. While access to schooling has improved across underserved communities, many classrooms continue to limit curiosity, critical thinking, and student participation. Through its early work in activity-based learning under the High School Leadership and Train-the-Trainers programs, Ek Kadam Aur observed that students learned more deeply when classrooms encouraged discussion, inquiry, hands-on activities, and real-world problem-solving.

These insights led to the formalization of the Active Learning Program in 2019. Middle school classrooms were identified as the initial focus, as this stage plays a decisive role in sustaining student engagement and shaping long-term learning outcomes. The program was designed to place learners at the center of the classroom, with teachers acting as facilitators and mentors who guide exploration rather than deliver information.

Early Implementation and Adaptation (2019–2020)

In its initial phase, the program piloted subject-specific modules in Biology and Mathematics. Teachers worked closely with the Ek Kadam Aur team to redesign lesson plans that prioritized exploration over memorization. Students were encouraged to ask questions, collaborate with peers, and demonstrate learning in diverse ways.

The COVID-19 pandemic posed significant challenges, yet it also underscored the flexibility of active learning approaches. Strategies were adapted for small-group instruction, home-based learning, and blended formats, demonstrating that effective active learning depends on pedagogy and mindset rather than physical infrastructure alone.


Strengthening Teacher Capacity (2020–2021)

Recognizing teachers as central to sustainable change, the program focused on intensive capacity building. Structured training equipped fourteen teachers with active learning methodologies, collectively impacting nearly 300 students. Teachers reported higher levels of student engagement, improved classroom relationships, and increased confidence in addressing diverse learning needs.




Policy Alignment and Academic Partnerships (2022)

The Active Learning Program aligned closely with India's National Education Policy 2020, particularly its emphasis on experiential and competency-based learning. In 2022, academic collaborations with Ramakrishna Mission College of Education, Coimbatore, and Avenues World School, São Paulo, strengthened academic rigor and enabled the exchange of global best practices.



Program Integration and Impact (2023–2024)

By 2023, Active Learning had evolved into a core pedagogical approach across Ek Kadam Aur's programs, including leadership development, teacher training, and inclusive education initiatives. In 2024, over 300 students directly benefited from active learning classrooms, while teachers continued to independently apply and refine these practices, demonstrating sustainability beyond the pilot phase.



Looking Ahead

As the program moves forward, the focus will be on deepening teacher mentorship, strengthening documentation of learning outcomes, and expanding to new geographies and grade levels. The Active Learning Program continues to reinforce the belief that meaningful learning flourishes when curiosity is encouraged, voices are respected, and classrooms function as communities of learners.

Second World Conference on Blindness



On February 8–9, 2025, Ek Kadam Aur hosted the Second World Conference on Blindness at Wipro’s Bengaluru campus. Anchored in the theme **“Reaching Unreached Children and Adults Through Educational Empowerment,”** the conference brought together educators, parents, researchers, and advocates to engage in thoughtful dialogue on inclusive education, digital literacy, advocacy, and blindness prevention, with a strong focus on practical and accessible approaches.

The Arunodaya (Sunrise) for Children with Blindness Program was presented as a community-based model that places families at the centre of a child’s learning journey. The discussions fostered shared understanding, encouraged cross-sector collaboration, and opened pathways for future academic partnerships and long-term impact research.



India Giving Day Concert

As part of India Giving Day 2025, Ek Kadam Aur Foundation organised a musical concert on March 8, 2025, at the Gaithersburg High School Auditorium in Maryland, USA. Led by **Sur Dhanuk Desi Bollywood**, the event featured live performances by the **Malhaar Band** and several accomplished vocalists.

The concert aimed to raise funds to support education for children with blindness in India through the Arunodaya Program. Over 400 attendees came together in solidarity to support inclusive education. Demonstrating strong leadership commitment, the Ek Kadam Aur Board of Directors matched all donations dollar-for-dollar, effectively doubling the impact of every contribution.



All funds raised support the expansion of educational access for children with visual blindness, enabling more children to attend school and pursue their aspirations. The event marked a significant milestone in the Foundation's global outreach and fundraising efforts, highlighting the power of community and music in driving social change.

Harvard ALI Social Impact Hackathon

In May 2025, Ek Kadam Aur participated in the Harvard Advanced Leadership Initiative Social Impact Hackathon at Harvard University, represented by Dr. Satish Tripathi and Dr. Deepthi Telikicherla.

Over two days of focused collaboration with global peers and mentors, the Foundation reflected on strengthening sustainability and scaling its impact. The Hackathon reaffirmed the relevance and effectiveness of the Arunodaya model and underscored the importance of clearer storytelling around unmet needs. Practical insights such as maintaining a real-time waitlist of children ready for enrolment helped sharpen how Ek Kadam Aur communicates impact to donors and partners.



American Foundation for the Blind Leadership Conference

In November 2025, Ek Kadam Aur Foundation participated in the American Foundation for the Blind Leadership Conference in Arlington, USA. The Foundation showcased its on-ground experience through the Arunodaya Program and subsequently contributed to a global panel discussion featuring Dr. Satish Tripathi and Dr. Deepthi Telikicherla.



The session examined how children with blindness learn in low-resource settings, where access to Braille materials and trained teachers is often limited. Ek Kadam Aur presented a balanced perspective - positioning digital access as a critical first step to ensure no child is excluded from education, while reaffirming Braille as essential for deeper and sustained learning.

The conference provided an important international platform to amplify Ek Kadam Aur's work and reinforced its commitment to ensuring that a child's access to education is not determined by geography.

EKA in the Media (USA)

Indian American Philanthropists Lead Global Movement for Blind Children's Empowerment

CHICAGO, IL – Indian Americans are bridging continents and transforming lives in rural India through the Ek Kadam Aur Foundation (EKA), a nonprofit organization registered in both the United States and India.

EKA's flagship initiative, "Arunodaya," meaning Sunrise in Sanskrit, seeks to empower more than 288,000 blind children in India, ensuring that visual impairment does not define their future. Founded by Dr. Satish Tripathi, based in the Chicago area, EKA combines personal engagement with innovative technology to create lasting impact.

The Arunodaya program provides individualized, home-based learning for children aged five to seventeen, often reaching remote villages with little or no access to specialized education. Mentors—many of whom are visually impaired themselves—visit children



six days a week, using smartphones, keyboards, and screen readers to teach skills such as object recognition, basic English, mathematics, and independent mobility. As children progress, they are prepared to transition into local mainstream schools.

Pradeep K. Agrawal, Professor Emeritus at the Georgia Institute of Technology and a member of EKA's board, emphasizes the foundation's 360-degree

approach. Beyond academics, the program assists families in securing government disability IDs and social welfare benefits, trains school staff to foster inclusive classrooms, and encourages peers to cultivate empathy and cooperation.

The impact has been profound. One mother shared:

"We had lost hope. But when the mentor started coming to our home, and my son began reading and speaking using the phone... it was like seeing sunrise after years of darkness."

Since its inception in 2015, EKA has trained over 740 children across eight Indian states, including Maharashtra, Chhattisgarh, and Andhra Pradesh. One hundred eighty-eight students have graduated from Phase 2 and continue their education in mainstream and specialized schools.
